Carriage House Construction Commencing

The Carriage House work is progressing. Staff from the Dept. of Parks & Recreation worked in the smoke from the Rim Fire in late August to relocate irrigation pipes and other utilities before the foundation excavation began.

In the first photo is the new configuration of irrigation pipes near the southwest corner of the Foreman-Roberts House. Kenny Fraser and his crew from Parks & Rec had to do some pretty interesting reconfiguration of irrigation lines and other underground infrastructure, much of which was under the footprint of the new Carriage House. With a site like this



in a historic area, there are often surprises underground, including abandoned sewer lines, massive tree roots, and footings for long forgotten outbuildings.



In the second photo, organization member Paula Cannon is standing on the entryway to the Foreman-Roberts House kitchen, seemingly "supervising" the

Parks & Rec fellows who are working on the irrigation system. Because of the complexity of the construction, the utilities to the Foreman-Roberts House had to be turned off for a number of weeks.

By the end of September workers had dug a hole (third photo, looking east). While they were removing dirt, some artifacts were found, probably in the area where the Roberts



family had their outhouse.



Pictured above are two bottles and a shard from a porcelain plate, near a credit card-size library card placed to indicate relative size. These were among some of the objects found at the site.



The maker's mark on the plate, "Edward Clarke//porcelain opaque//Tunstall," tells us the pottery was made by one of the North Staffordshire Potteries in the UK sometime between 1865 and 1877. The mark used by the pottery firm is derived from the English Royal coat of arms. The fact that this mark was used probably indicates that the manufacturer had supplied goods to the Royal family for a period of at least five years, a sign of prestige.



Finally, here is a picture taken Oct. 23 of the west stem wall, looking south from Corbett St. A new ADA-compliant ramp will be built between the Foreman-Roberts House kitchen and the Carriage House, serving both structures, whose entrances will be facing each other on the same elevation.

Third Thursday Lecture Series

Several lectures have taken place since the last newsletter came out in early June. These lectures are presented by the CCHS in cooperation with the Carson City Library.

On June 20, Sally Whipple Mosher Mooney presented a lecture called "On the Sunnyside of Life," based on her book by the same name, at the Carson City Library auditorium. Her book is a fascinating collection of short stories about life on an isolated cattle ranch, Sunnyside Ranch, in eastern Nevada, where she grew up.

On July 18, Tom Henderson presented a free "walking lecture" on the "History of Trees in Carson City" at the State Capital Grounds. Many of the Eastern ornamental trees planted by George Washington Gale Ferris, Sr. (father of the inventor of the Ferris wheel) in the late 1800s still adorn the Capitol grounds. Before the walking lecture, Lee Ann Keever showed a video at the Carson City Library auditorium. She and others produced the video when she was head of the Shade Tree Council. The video contained historic information about the architecture of early Carson City and how trees were used in in the early

days. The present head of the Shade Tree Council, Kyle Horvath, introduced Ms. Keever.

On Aug. 15, about 60 people attended "Nevada State Prison: A History." The lecture was held at The BRIC (Business Resource Innovation Center). It was a tight fit with all those people, but the presenters, who are coauthors of the recently published book, Nevada State Prison, kept the audience attention with fascinating facts. The book relates the history of Nevada State

Prison (NSP), which was founded in 1862, before Nevada was "battle born." The authors are shown here on the steps of NSP. They are, left to right, Curt Thomas, Jennifer



E. Riddle, Stacy L. Branham, and Sena M. Loyd (who was recently selected as the new Director of the Carson City Library). The audience seemed particularly interested in the mechanics of the execution process. (In 2014 we intend to present a lecture about the efforts by the Nevada State Prison Preservation Society to preserve the prison as a museum.)

On Sept. 19, Mary Fischer presented "Carson City's History in Motion" at The BRIC. She discussed the various artistic vignettes at each of the gateways and interchanges of the Carson City Freeway/Bypass. Residents and visitors of Carson City may be familiar with the large eagle sculpture at the north end of the Bypass introducing southbound travelers to the Eagle Valley. Vignettes along the Bypass to the south, as far as Fairview Drive, relate to the history of Carson City.

No more "Third Thursday" lectures are planned for this year, but we are working on plans to have lectures in 2014 about train photography in Carson City, Reno politics in the 1930s, Great Basin Indians, and other subjects. These events will be posted on our website (CCHistorical.org) and announced in the papers. If you have suggestions for future lectures, please
