Adele's Dollhouse Debut

Scheduled for November Reveal--We all have memories of delicious dining and special events at Adele's Restaurant in Carson City. Unfortunately, following a destructive fire, the building was eventually razed to make room for an expanded gas station. The Carson City Historical Society has been gifted with a replica of that building in the form of a dollhouse, generously donated by Diane Bertrum from Washington State, along with a notarized transfer of ownership. Now restored and finished, the house is ready for its welcome mat. We will host an open "house" for members only on Saturday, Nov. 5 from 1 pm to 3 pm at the Carriage House. The public is invited on Sunday, Nov. 6 from 1 to 3 p.m. There will be a cash bar from the Royal Peacock Traveling Cocktail Coach

Diane Bertrum, the donor worked at Porter's Music Box, later renamed Adele's, in her teenage years and met her husband there. He had a replica made for her from the 1870 blueprints, but it wasn't quite finished and remained in the box for almost 50 years. The basic mansard house was done, but the painting and finishing touches had not been completed. The Society is having the paint and finishing bric-a-brac put on by Jim DeMagistris and his staff. Sutro Tunnel Vision Accompanied by Local Folks

A presentation of the Sutro Tunnel and its ongoing restoration was presented Sept. 25 at the Carriage House by Chris Pattison, Project Manager of the Friends of Sutro Tunnel, an organization working to return the site back to being as historically accurate as possible. Chris is also a board member of the Carson City Historical Society. Almost 30 people attended the program and got the extraordinary chance to also hear personal accounts from two people who lived on and near the Sutro Tunnel site.

The first special speaker was Lola Gordon from Reno, whose uncle ranched in the Sutro area and was very familiar with the land. She brought unique photographs of the buildings and property. Mrs. Gordon is also a member of the Teddy Bear Club of Reno and Carson City. Also attending the presentation were five members of the Teddy Bear Club, a social organization of aficionados and collectors of teddy bears.

The second presenter was Loretta Williams, Society member, who lived in one of the houses on the Sutro tract. She shared memories of the events, celebrations, and good times that happened there.

Listening to first-hand accounts brought the Sutro site and its history to a fresh reality and accessibility.

Chris reported that the purpose of restoring the tunnel was to create a place that people can visit and understand the effort which went into its original construction. In 1860 Adolph Sutro was a Prussian mining entrepreneur who proposed a drainage tunnel to allow access to deeper mineral exploration in the Comstock. The main tunnel connected to the Savage Mine in 1878, and water started being released in 1879. The tunnel is 3.88 miles long, connected to the Comstock Lode. It begins in Dayton and proceeds to the Savage Mine in Virginia City. Below, Chris Pattison, talks about the Sutro Tunnel.



Brief History of Adele's and the Adele's Doll House

On May 29, 1874, an article appeared in, The Daily Appeal: “A dwelling is being built by Captain Porter of the V. & T. Fronts on North Carson Street. Of moderate size, but will be a handsome house. Has a French or Mansard roof—the first of the kind in Carson. Will be a decided ornament to the north end. Should like to see more of the same kind going up.”

It has a mansard roof and dormer windows typical of a Victorian building style, also called “Second Empire.”

In 1880 the home became the property of Benjamin F. Slater who worked in the V. & T. shops.

In March 1884 Judge Michael Augustus Murphy owned the house. He was a native of Aurora and received his education in Carson City schools and the University of Nevada. He was a judge, attorney and land owner. When he died in 1909, his son Frank Murphy, one of the five children, continued to live in the home until the 1920's. Frank worked for the Virginia and Truckee Railroad as a baggage handler.

It was purchased by Bill Porter in 1958 and became home to “Porter's Music Box,” a bar and antique shop. “Before they opened

their handsome old Victorian house on Carson Street as a decorous and dignified bar and place of entertainment, Porter and his wife knew they were taking a gamble, but after a year Porter's had become a good place to spend a pleasant evening," according to the Journal reporter. He combined antiques and top-drawer professional "live" music. Originally, the red and white Victorian house was run as an antique shop. Bill Porter decided it was time to retire in 1977.

In 1978 it was purchased by the Abowds, and the name was changed to Adele's when restoration and renovation was done.

In April 2020, the beloved and popular Adele's was closed after a fire. Adele's restaurant was a mainstay in Carson City—a place where wonderful memories were made. After the fire the house and property were purchased by a gas station company. Efforts were made to move the structure, but there was a tight timeline and there wasn't enough money donated to pay to move it to another location. It was a historical landmark on Carson Street and was replaced with a gas station and parking lot.

Last year the Society got an email regarding a dollhouse that was made to replicate "The Music Box" or "Adele's." The replica was made from the original 1870 home blueprints. The name of the donor is Diane Grayson Bertrum, who lives in Washington State. She worked in "Porter's Music Box" (Adele's) when she was in high school and met her husband there. He had a replica of the dollhouse made for her. When I talked to her it had been in the original box for almost 50 years.

In light of losing the historic Adele's she decided to donate the dollhouse to the Carson City Historical Society. She drove it from Washington State in the back of her car to Carson City. It came with the basic mansard house partially done, but the bric-a-brac, painting and finishing touches had not been completed. Diane said, "I wanted to bring the house home (to Carson) where it belongs." The Society is having Jim DeMagistris, of Woodworking Specialties, complete the final "Adele's." The project will be done in late October and will be on display in the Carriage House, 1207 North Carson, Carson City, Nevada, for the open house, where it will be on permanent display.
